Program: Chris Konetski, Rock County Humane Society

Ms. Konetski presented 3 issues facing the Rock County area in regards to animals. She clarified some recent newspaper articles. The first issue is that Rock County has an overpopulation of

animals. Over the last 10 years, they have seen approximately 3400-3500 animals come in each year. Last year 4200 animals came in. Most of which are casts or kittens because their breeding is out of control. The Humane society helped 110 people last year financially with getting pets spade or neutered. The city pays approximately \$35 per animal that comes in for 7 days worth of holding, then the humane society takes over the costs. This is quite a chunk of change for a year because of overpopulation. The second issue is about the dog fighting going on in Rock County. They are seeing numerous animals coming in after losing in fights. The humane society is setting up committees to head this up. They have identified a ring of fighting that extends from Chicago to Rockford to Beloit to Racine. The third issue is fundraising. The Humane society needs money and supplies to help with the events they do such as Pet Pictures with Santa, Dog walk fundraiser, their shelter partners program, and the pet parade which is shown numerous times in both Janesville and Beloit.
