Program: Dr. Jason Stuckey, Costa Rica Service Mission

Dr. Jason Stuckey presented information from a Service Trip he and 6 other Chiropractors took to Costa Rica in October of 2004. This was a Service

Mission that is done by graduates of the Palmer School of Chiropractics.

Dr. Stuckey first gave some background on Dr. Clarence Gonstead, who was a leader in the chiropractic field. His system is based on the health and integrity of the Intervertral Disc. Dr. Gonstead built the largest Chiropractic Practice in the world in Mt. Horeb, WI. His motto was: 'Find the problem, Fix It and Leave it alone.'

Regarding the Costa Rica trip, it was a 5-day trip during which the group provided adjustments to over 500 patients 2 days. Health care is very expensive for the average person. The balance of their time was spent traveling the country. They also donated 140# of school supplies to schools they visited.

Costa Rica has the oldest stable democracy in Latin America. Other interesting information:

- Literacy Rate of 96.2%
Leading industries are agriculture and high tech jobs.
Two Seasons - Rainy (May-November) and Dry (December-April).
Average Temperature 75 degrees, warmer on the coasts.

Did You Know?

From 1915 to 1919, the organization of new Kiwanis clubs was managed by a professional organizer, Allen Simpson Browne, who can be credited with creating Kiwanis. In return for building new clubs, he received a portion of every new membership fee. This arrangement led to increasing controversy about the purpose and control of the organization. The problem was solved when Kiwanis International "bought itself" from Browne at the 1919 convention in Birmingham, Alabama. Club delegates raised \$17,500 on the convention floor to purchase Browne's rights to the Kiwanis name and organization.
